Academic Publishing Center (APC) Framework for OA Book Development in Nigeria



A Sustainable, Community-Driven Publishing Model for Nigerian Higher Education

This framework expands on the FUTMinna APC BookHub project, and aligns with its commitment to advance academic publishing in Nigeria through open access and digital innovation.

1. Vision and Objectives

Vision:

Position Nigerian institutions as leaders in **Open Access (OA)** publishing, ensuring **cost-free** access to high-quality, locally authored academic materials while fostering **regional and global collaboration**.

Objectives:

- Sustainably democratise access to academic content through Open Access (OA), eliminating financial barriers for authors and readers.
- Develop a non-commercial publishing ecosystem using open-source tools and shared editorial resources.
- Strengthen institutional ownership of Open Access (OA) publishing to reduce dependence on commercial publishing models.
- Support policy-driven Open Access (OA) adoption, integrating national higher education and research policies.
- Encourage multilingual academic publishing, including indigenous Nigerian languages.

2. Core Components

i. Community-Driven Diamond OA Model

- Develop shared digital publishing infrastructure for the Academic Publishing Centers (APCs) network across six Nigerian geopolitical zones, with FUTMinna as a national coordinator.
- Leverage existing university presses in transitioning from legacy publishing models to Open Access.
- Collaborate with key stakeholders, including TETFund, NUC, LIBSENSE, UNESCO, Open Book Collective, DOAB, and national and regional research networks for funding, policy implementation, buy-in, and partnerships.
- Integrate community-led editorial models, ensuring academic autonomy and local content relevance.
- Engage Early Career Researchers (ECRs) in advocacy, research, and capacity-building to support OA expansion.

ii. Capacity Building for Open Access Publishing

- Train university-based editors, librarians, and faculty in OA publishing, peer review, and copyright management.
- Develop localised OA publishing guides aligned with Nigerian research priorities and international OA best practices.
- Establish mentorship programs for early-career researchers and postgraduate students, encouraging academic writing in Open Access environments.
- Facilitate ECR-led training on open-source tools, metadata management, and digital preservation.

iii. Institutional OA Policy Development

- Advocate for the Model Open Science Policy of Nigeria (2024) that mandates Open Access for publicly funded research and academic books.
- Ensure alignment with global open science frameworks (e.g., UNESCO's Open Access Recommendations).
- Introduce OA publishing as a recognised academic contribution in university promotion and tenure criteria.
- Encourage institutional mandates requiring OA book deposits in university repositories.
- Engage ECRs in drafting institutional OA policies and facilitating university policy discussions.

3. Implementation Plan

Phase 1: Demonstrator Development (Jan – Aug 2025)

- FUTMinna APC pilot launched.
- Establish a shared publishing infrastructure via the BookHub platform
- Eight (8) digitised OA books ingested, with the first open access books using the BookHub platform published.
- Develop a governance model for a National OA Publishing Network

Phase 2: National Expansion (Sept – Dec 2025)

- Host a National Open Access Book Stakeholder Summit.
- National policy advocacy with TETFund and regulators.
- Onboard first partner institutions into the APC framework.
- Conduct training workshops for editors, librarians, and faculty on OA workflows.

Phase 3: National Scaling & Policy Integration (Jan 2026 - Dec 2027)

- Integration with library consortia and national research networks.
- Implement a cost-sharing model among institutions for sustainable OA publishing.
- Deploy a metrics dashboard to track OA adoption and impact.
- Integrate multilingual and indigenous language publishing support.
- Continuous funding engagement with global OA initiatives.

4. Sustainability Strategy

i. Financial Sustainability

- **National-Level Funding:** Secure TETFund support for Diamond OA book publishing under research funding schemes.
- **Institutional Cost-Sharing Model:** Universities contribute editorial and technical resources instead of relying on Article Processing Charges
- **Cross-Institutional Collaboration:** Develop regional publishing consortia to pool subscription resources and share editorial expertise.
- Revenue Generation through Print-on-Demand and EPUB Sales: Implement a hybrid sustainability model where institutions and individuals can access digital versions of OA books for free while offering **affordable print-on-demand and EPUB sales** to generate revenue.
- Other funding sources such as Endowments, Grants and Institutional Generated Revenue (IGR)

ii. Technical & Infrastructure Sustainability

- **Utilise open-source platforms** to avoid commercial vendor lock-in.
- **Implement long-term digital preservation mechanisms** (Persistent Identifiers (PIDs), metadata integration).
- **Integrate AI-powered tools** for book design, metadata management and automated copyediting.
- Interoperate with existing national digital infrastructure (e.g. Institutional Repository, National Repository etc)

iii. Monitoring & Evaluation

- Track **Open Access book production rates** across Nigerian universities.
- Measure **global impact** via citations, downloads, and open usage statistics.
- Conduct **annual policy reviews**, refining strategies based on real-world data.

5. Expected Outcomes

- A national OA publishing framework**, reducing Nigeria's reliance on commercial publishing models.
- Significant growth in freely available academic materials**, improving accessibility of research output.
- A self-sustaining OA book publishing network** integrating universities, libraries, and funding bodies.
- More substantial institutional recognition for OA publishing**, encouraging faculty participation.

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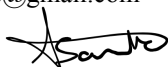
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
